Feline Preventive Health Care Schedule

Vaccinations:

<u>~8 – 10 weeks of age</u>	FVRCP (Rhinotracheitis, Calicivirus, Panleukopenia)
<u>~12 – 14 weeks of age</u>	FVRCP Feline Leukemia/Feline Immunodeficiency Virus test Feline Leukemia Virus Vaccine
<u>~15 – 16 weeks of age</u>	FVRCP Feline Leukemia Rabies

Feline Leukemia is boosted annually. Rabies and FVRCP are boosted one year after the first vaccine, then every three years.

- Important Feline Leukemia/Feline Immunodeficiency Virus Information

We strongly recommend vaccinating all cats against Feline Leukemia for their first year of life, and boosting based on their risk after that. We also recommend testing cats for Feline Leukemia and Feline Immunodeficiency Virus prior to vaccinating.

- Intestinal Parasite Control

We strongly recommend a fecal exam at 6-12 weeks of age and annually thereafter. If your cat is outdoors at all, it should be dewormed monthly for ascarids (roundworms and hookworms) and every 3 months for tapeworms.

- Flea Control

We strongly recommend the use of flea control products in cats that go outdoors or are exposed to other pets that go outdoors. (Easy Spot, Bravecto or Revolution are carried here)

- Surgery

Spay (female cat)- at least 6 months of age

Neuter (male cat)- at least 6 months of age

Declaw (2 paws)- at least 6 months of age

Blood chemistry evaluation is recommended on all animals prior to anesthesia, pain medication (injection in hospital and liquid or tablets to go home for 3 days) and E-collar to prevent licking and chewing at surgery site.
